From Your Pastor

Then He opened their minds so they could understand the Scriptures. He told them, "This is what is written: The Christ will suffer and rise from the dead on the third day, and repentance and forgiveness of sins will be preached in His name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem" (Luke 24:45-47).

Years ago, an expert on time management spoke to a group of business students. As he stood in front of these high-powered overachievers, he said, "Okay, time for a quiz." He pulled out a one-gallon, wide-mouthed mason jar and set it on a table. Next, he produced about a dozen fist-sized rocks and carefully placed them, one at a time, into the jar. When no more rocks would fit inside, he asked, "Is this jar full?"

Everyone said, "yes." The instructor came back: "really?" He reached under the table and pulled out a bucket of sand. As he poured the sand, it filtered into the empty spaces left between the rocks. Once more he asked, "Is this jar full?" "No!" The class shouted. Without replying, the expert grabbed a pitcher of water and began to pour until the jar was filled to the brim.

He then asked, "What is the point of this illustration?" One eager beaver raised his hand said, "The point is no matter how full your schedule may be, if you try really hard, you can always fit more into it!" "No," the speaker replied, "That's not the point."

Do you know the point? Think for a few moments. The professor told his class, just like I'm sharing with you, the point is this: "If you don't put the big

rocks in first, you'll never get them in at all!"

So, what are the big things in your life? The things you dare not neglect? As a Christian, I am firmly convinced that there is no more important thing than to believe in Jesus Christ as your Savior. St. Paul wrote, "I delivered to you as of *first importance* what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that He was buried, that He was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures" (1 Corinthians 15:3-4, emphasis added). The biggest thing in life is to hold on to God's gift of faith, which He has worked in us, to believe that Jesus died for the forgiveness of our sins and that He rose from

the dead to break the power of death for us, that we may have life with Him now and forever.

The next "big thing" in life for us as Christians, then is to follow Jesus as the Lord and Master of our lives—to live for Him. This next big thing in our lives begins with faithful worship of our loving and merciful God, who has created us, redeemed and saved us, and brought us to faith! We arrange our lives so that worship takes a priority, as God directs us also in the Third Commandment. Worship should be on our schedule every week-before any other activity—if physically possible (and yes, we know some people are scheduled to work on Sunday, but don't confuse "have to" with a choice). Jesus also said, "Seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be added to you" (Matt. 6:33, emphasis added). I was blessed with a Christian father who was a farmer, and who always put weekly worship first. After milking the cows and the related chores, we went to church and Sunday School (in fact he rarely worked at all on Sunday except for milking and the other chores—and there was plenty of other work he could have done!) I am thankful for my father's example which proved to me life "works" that way, because God blesses faithfulness.

The next big thing for us as Christians is to share Jesus with those who are close to us. Jesus said, "You will be My witnesses" (Acts 1:8). Beginning right now, share with those special people—family, friends, neighbors, co-workers—how, through Jesus, they can be rescued from sin, death, and the devil's power.

You may do many things with your life, see many sights, and have a lengthy list of accomplishments. Still, when your last day comes, you will know the biggest thing you have ever done is to have believed and shared how Jesus suffered and rose from the dead for you and for all the world. The biggest things in life are faith in Jesus as our Savior, arranging life as He calls us to follow, and sharing Jesus right where you are.



Dear members of Immanuel Lutheran:

I wanted to take the time to thank you for supporting the educational ministry at Unity Ridge Lutheran School, especially during our inaugural year 2023-2024.

Our development needs are twofold. The cost of educating one child exceeds what we charge in tuition. This is what I call a "tuition gap." Our estimated gap is \$931 per TK-12 student. The second variable for our development needs is the Unity Ridge grant. We make it possible for those who really want to come but can't quite meet the financial requirements.

For the 2023-2024 school year our development goal is \$115,000. To date we have \$64,000 as of January 31, 2024.

It warms my heart to know you are with us on this journey. Thank you for your generous gift in January. I also appreciate you sharing Pastor Mahnken as he serves on our Board of Directors as the pastoral advisor. We love his guidance, humor, and words of wisdom.

The children will get bumps and bruises when we play outside and they know if they come to us we will pray for God to heal their "owies." There is one child in particular I suspect enjoys getting bruises just so they

can come get prayer. The other day (see, here comes my impatience) after about five or six half-hearted prayers, this great idea came to me. I suggested one of her friends pray for her. Guess what happened? We now have a playground prayer warrior. As I watched the day unfold (and days since), this little tike has taken it as her own personal calling to pray for her peers as they get hurt. What a blessing to get to tell her parents last night that she seems to have the call of an intercessor on her life. It's evident her love for Jesus and the joy she receives by talking to Him. I pray she continues on this path of faith and enjoying her times of talking to Jesus.

Another parent shared that her child came home and was telling their sibling all the details of Jesus' death and resurrection. She said the sibling looked at her and said, "Mom, is that true?" Mom affirmed that yes, it is true! Isn't it amazing? The children are learning to share the Gospel!

As the year is reaching just a couple of months left, it seems all kinds of fun personality traits are surfacing. As teachers, we like to call it "the sweet spot" where things are clicking and coming together. (Did I mention it is also the time of the year when the weather has been warm and the littles are wound for sound and LOUD?) I just love seeing their God-given strengths come to the surface. They are truly created for a purpose and are already walking in allowing the Holy Spirit to use them. I pray as they finish the year and afternoon class begins to think about transitioning into Kindergarten, they will have deep roots. I pray that they will be protected from the enemy's attempt to pluck out those roots. I pray that they will allow themselves to be used to glorify God.

AFRICAN RADIO MINISTRIES-NEWS

Dear Mission Friends.

In May 2017, John and Linda Kurtz traveled to Ethiopia to see what God was doing in that ancient yet vibrant country. Pastor Demeke Ture brought them to Hosanna Prison where they witnessed the baptism of 9 men and 4 women. At the end of the service, we were surprised and deeply grateful to God to hear the chairman of the Prisoners Mission Committee give a report on their missionary progress. All were praying that Linda's group (Hope and Care Outreach) would partner with ARM to manage the radio evangelism work. After the service at the prison we asked, "Well Linda, are you in?" Her answer: "How could I not be?" Now, 7 years later, the two organizations have merged, and Linda is our new President with Jesus as CEO.

During the same visit, Demeke brought us to see the Shashogo Bible School not far from the prison. The School has struggled to operate with a volunteer staff and very few benches and books. The local Government officials only recently approved requests to make improvements. Now, in God's perfect time, a dear friend of ARM has pledged to cover the costs for furniture, remodeling, repairs, electricity, books, a fence around the property and more. Recently a technical school and a high school were built across the road from Shashogo Bible School putting the Bible school evangelists in contact with hundreds of students.

Rev. Ture has moved to Minneapolis where he is a pastor for a growing congregation of Ethiopian immigrants. He and his wife are from the Hosanna area and are very happy about the Bible School and its future. He will be supervising and reporting on progress.

Linda is now in Liberia supervising the ARM programs and the work of Hope and Care Outreach. We will hear about her work there and share it with you when she returns later this month.






You are invited to join our Thursday evening study group as we begin a new study, reading and reviewing the little (151 pages) book "Martin Luther on Mental Health."

- * We are in the season of Lent for our midweek services. I wrote a series called "Broken." We are all broken people living in a broken world. Brokenness is all around us! However, we are not alone. Jesus understands our brokenness and is with us in the midst of it. When He goes to the cross, He takes our brokenness and makes it whole. I think people are finding healing in this.

Minnesota's attack on religious liberty Will Christians be at least as resolved as the state's transgender activists?

In my home state of Minnesota, open religious persecution is on the docket. Those in power aim to use the coercive force of the state to tell religious institutions who they can hire. This includes churches, mosques, and synagogues as well as religious educational institutions. For all the talk about the separation of church and state today, some lawmakers want to dictate the hiring process for churches. I wish this were an overstatement, but it accurately reflects the political aims of the majority party in my state.

Last year was the first session in years where the Democrats in Minnesota gained control of all branches of state government—the House of Representatives, Senate, and the governor's office. They didn't waste any time. They passed a litany of bills aimed at turning Minnesota into a progressive utopia. These laws where shocking for Christians throughout the state, especially the bills addressing transgenderism.

What went largely unnoticed was the rewriting of the state's *Human Rights Act*. Legislators added "gender identity" as a protected class. Unlike other protected classes, this one did not include an exemption for religious institutions. Some legislators thought this was simple oversight and have sought to remedy it this session.

It wasn't an oversight. It was intentional. Within the last month, both the House and Senate Judiciary Committees considered an amendment that would have added a religious exemption to the "gender identity" category. Both committees, dominated by Democrats, voted it down. One representative who opposed the amendment described the idea of religious institutions possessing this freedom as "infuriating," "disgusting," and "ridiculous."

Apparently, churches hiring their pastors based on the belief that men are men and women are women is ridiculous. This is the bizarro world of Minnesota politics. Here, apparently, it is less disgusting for the state (the people with badges and guns) to coerce churches to submit to erasure of their First Amendment rights than it is to allow anyone to question the dogma of gender theory. This threat is not just an abstract idea, as at least one religious school currently faces an employment complaint under this unconstitutional new language. In Minnesota, it is supposedly "saner" to deny biological realities than to protect our most fundamental rights. History is not kind to those who use badge and guns to coerce belief and to stifle dissent.

This brazen attack on religious liberty has created a stir for the various faiths in Minnesota. It was an odd sight to see Muslim, Jewish, and Christian leaders speak in unison on religious liberty and then to see them all attacked by activist leftist legislators and citizens. The political dividing lines are realigning as leftists demand total submission to their dogma. This latest attack demonstrates there is no respect for the sphere of the church from those on the political left.

What is the church in Minnesota to do? Will Christians stand up? For all the contradictions that plague queer gender theory, the people who hold that theory live with bold zealotry and confidence. They are willing to sacrifice and face scorn for their beliefs. In terms of their zeal, they put some Christians to shame.

As a local pastor and lifelong Minnesotan, I've been part of many efforts at our State Capitol to stem the tide. In my experience, there is no shortage of people, groups, and organizations that will line up to speak in favor of this wicked agenda. The same is not true when looking for voices, boldness, and courage in defense of righteousness. Will this latest overstep be the clarion call that finally awakens Minnesota's Christians?

Earlier this year, I was part of a denominational meeting that considered publicly calling the State of Minnesota and its leadership to repentance. This was in response to the evils passed in the last legislative session. Sadly, the idea did not receive enough support from denominational representatives to pass. Fear, apathy, and a distorted belief in the separation of church and state stymied any potential unity. Will this new open attack motivate pastors and other Christians to action? Can evangelicals in Minnesota muster even a fraction of the courage, faith, and dedication that we see from the other side? Will we live like we take seriously our confessed faith as true?

The time has come for ministers of various denominations to formally speak on these issues. This latest attack demonstrates there is no respect for the sphere of the church from those on the political left. If government officials enforce the leftists' gender identity legislation, our denominational squabbles will be greatly overshadowed by demands that churches hire pastors who deny the creational realities of manhood and womanhood. Your church could be sued for not hiring a cross-dressing youth pastor who denies that sex is binary.

Faithful Lutherans, Catholics, Baptists, and others must temporarily set aside their differences long enough to unite in the necessary common cause to speak in unison against this proposed tyranny. If religious institutions are not free to hire as they want, then they are not free to believe as they want. This is the very freedom many Christians throughout history sacrificed to find. We cannot let it go without a fight.
