#### **From Your Pastor**

#### **Practicing the Secret**

Amy Hall of Stand to Reason (www.str.org) introduces us to a wonderful, grace-filled truth with these words of introduction: "I don't need to tell you that life is hard. The older you are, the better you know this. The heavy burdens of past grief, present suffering, and anxiety about the future can easily overwhelm us, but they don't have to. There's wisdom about handling suffering to be learned from those who have gone through it before us."

Hall then continues with an illustration given by Tim Challies, who wrote about the unexpected loss of his only son in *Seasons of Sorrow: The Pain* of Loss and the Comfort of God. He had this to say:

"My father was a landscaper, and he used to take me to work with him from time to time. I remember one day when he brought me with him to be an unskilled but low-cost source of manual labor. He showed me a skid of bricks that had been delivered to the end of a client's driveway and then a walkway he was building to the front door. My job was to get the bricks from the first spot to the second. I remember gazing at the giant pile with despair. How could I, at twelve or thirteen years of age, possibly move what looked like a literal ton of bricks? I realized I would have to do it the only way I could. Piece by piece, brick by brick, step by step, I carried each one to my father. He laid them as guickly as I could bring them to him until a perfect path led to the entrance of that beautiful home.

"And just so, while God has called me to bear my grief for a lifetime, and to do so faithfully, He has not called me to bear the entire weight of it all at once. As the pile is made up of many bricks, a lifetime is made up of many days. The burden of a whole lifetime's grief would be far too heavy to bear, and the challenge of a whole lifetime's faithfulness far too daunting to consider. But the God who knows my frailty has broken down that assignment into little parts, little days, and has promised a grace that is sufficient for

each one of them. My challenge for today is not to bear the grief of a lifetime or to be faithful to the end. But only to carry today's grief and only to be faithful on this one little day that He has spread out before me."

The truth "discovered" by Tim Challies by experience, and learned by many unnamed Christians throughout time, was actually the "secret" revealed by Paul two thousand years ago in Philippians 4. Here's what he said about living in an unpredictable world where suffering and death are inevitable: "I have learned to be content in whatever circumstances I am. I know both how to have a little, and I know how to have a lot. In any and all circumstances I have learned the secret of being content—whether well fed or hungry, whether in abundance or in need. I am able to do all things through Him who strengthens me" (4:11-13).

That's the secret: "I can do all things through Him who strengthens me." That is the truth we have to practice trusting, and as we practice, we will experience God's faithfulness and get better at trusting over time. There are two related principles in Challies' illustration for us to grasp and learn to live by: 1) Don't try to bear all the griefs and sufferings ahead of you all at onceespecially not the imagined ones; and, 2) Trust that God will give you what you need to bear your grief and suffering on the day when you need it. This is how we fight both despair about our present and anxiety about our future. Letting go of anxiety and trusting God like this can feel like leaping off a cliff into an abyss. But the ledge is there, just out of sight, and it will hold you.

"What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare His own Son but gave Him up for us all, how will He not also with Him graciously give us all things?" (Romans 8:31-32).



# Distant Echoes By Colleen Coble

Kaia Oana is a research biologist with Seaworthy Lab Research on Kauai, one of the islands in the beautiful Hawaiian Islands. She has been training an orphan bottlenose dolphin calf, along with two other dolphins, to understand signs and signals that she gives them. She has been working hard with them to prove their worth so that her boss won't carry through with his threat of selling their research center for a more profitable tourist dolphin show.

One morning while she and her brother are out on her boat working with the dolphins, they hear an explosion and find that a tourist boat has been hit by an errant missile from the local navy base. Many injured survivors are in the water and Kaia and her brother start to rescue the injured. She calls her dolphins and they swim among the injured, letting them grab onto their fins. Jesse Matthews Lieutenant Commander of the local Navy base soon arrives with a crew to help evacuate the wounded. Jesse is amazed by the rescue efforts by Kaia, her brother and the dolphins.

The Navy will soon recruit Kaia and her dolphins to help them patrol the coast and harbors looking for anything that might be involved in the sabotage of their new missile system.

This was a good story full of Hawaiian culture, language, traditions and interesting personal stories.

#### Pastor Mahnken's Report Voters' Meeting--July 9, 2023

We began 2023 with 608 baptized members on the books; and 501 communicant members on the books. We have received 9 by Holy Baptism (2 adults, who were also added as communicant members). We have added 7 communicant members by adult confirmation. We added six to our number of communicant members by Jr. Confirmation. We have had two deaths: Larry Clausen and Judie Clausen. We released two from our roll by personal request. As of today, July 9, 2023 we have 618 baptized members on and 510 communicant members on our roll.

I again encourage you, as I did at our last quarterly meeting, to please remember our Saturday evening worship (5 p.m.) if you have other plans on Sunday. Please do not let the busyness of life keep you from worship! Plan ahead and keep the most important time of your week. The same is true if you will be vacationing in the coming months. Plan ahead and visit a church were you will be. You can search for churches and worship times by going to our Synod's websitelcms.org. When you open the site, click in the upper right hand corner on the "Locators" tab. Then click on "Find a Church." The congregation's phone number will also be listed. I encourage you to call ahead, because sometimes the worship times have been changed from what is listed on the web site.

Please remember in your prayers your brothers and sisters in Christ who are members of St. John, Kiron and Faith, Deloit as they soon consider options for their pastoral care. Pastor Kluzek has accepted the call to serve the Lord's saints at St. Peter, Wapello, Iowa. President Turner and our Circuit Visitor, Pastor Chad Trunkhill will be meeting with the Elders of those two congregations this coming Wednesday.

Also, this coming Wednesday will be the first Annual Meeting of Unity Ridge Lutheran School. The Board of Directors will be elected and reports will be given. I have served as the Pastoral Counselor for the Unity Ridge Board this past year and I have submitted my name for the ballot for the coming year. The term of service for the Pastoral Counselor is one year.

Also please keep in your prayers Christ Lutheran Church in Denison as they have called a pastor to serve them. He visited with leaders of the congregation this past week.

Finally, I again remind you of my prayer challenge for us all: Please join me three times a day in prayer for the spiritual growth of the members of Immanuel. Please pray three times a day! Pray that the eyes of our hearts may be opened to the wonder of God's grace. Pray for the Holy Spirit to be at work among us. Pray on behalf of the families and children of Immanuel that they will be blessed with a love for Jesus and a growing zeal to live for Him in this darkening age. God's Word through Moses applies to all of us as God's people for all time: "Only take care, and keep your soul diligently, lest you forget the things that your eyes have seen, and lest they depart from your heart all the days of your life. Make them known to your children and your children's children" (Deut. 4:9). And again, "Take care lest you forget the LORD your God by not keeping His commandments and His rules and His statutes, which I command you today, lest, when you have eaten and are full and have built good houses and live in them, and when your herds and flocks multiply and your silver and gold is multiplied and all that you have is multiplied, then your heart be lifted up, and you forget the LORD your God" (Deut. 8:11-14). "Remember Jesus Christ our Savior, the same yesterday, and today, and forever" (Heb. 13:8).

"And thank the Lord Jesus for His promise that whatever we ask the Father in His name, He will give it to us for the glory of our Savior (John 15:16)." I thank you for your prayers.



Anticipation. It's a loaded word, isn't it? It can bring up the image of something wonderful or dread-filled. You can be at the doctor preparing to receive a shot and clench your arm in anticipation of the prick or at a wedding anticipating the bride's walk down the aisle with a grin of eagerness on your face. (Okay men, you might have to pretend you're the groom.) The type of anticipation you experience is directly connected to the event you are awaiting. Of course, it makes sense.

Anticipation is the word I would currently connect to the upcoming preschool year. It's mid-July as I type this newsletter, and I'm already anticipating children walking through the doors in a few weeks. Because I am anticipating their arrival, I am also preparing. It actually increases the level of expectancy to have things to do to "get ready."

A theme has been chosen for the year, "Jesus' Love is a Bubblin' Over". Does it sound familiar? Yes, it's a song most of us know and likely sang as children. It's the prayer for the year and holds the expectant anticipation of what we will see unfold. I pray (please join me as God brings them to mind) that the children will arrive and sense the Spirit of God awaiting them. I pray they will see Jesus in the teachers, staff, parents, and each other. I pray as they enter through the front doors they will know He is at work simply by experiencing walking into a place where He resides. I pray His love is bubbling over so strongly in this place that children's and families' lives will be touched and changed. And I pray that as Jesus' love continues to take root in them, it will "bubble over" into the lives of their family members. I pray that parents and grandparents will be bubbling so big that they look like a pot of boiling water. Oh, yes, we are expectant with anticipation.

I have been ordering name tags, bulletin board materials, and am gearing up to send out the summer mailing. Doris has graciously organized the rooms and a huge shout out to Neal for building the shelf to hold supplies. There is a lot behind the scenes that goes into anticipating the arrival of the littles and we want to be ready.

There is also the anticipation of some challenges. While I don't want to bring on anything negative by expecting some bumps in our year, it is safe to assume someone will scrape their knee, get their feelings hurt, and think listening to the adults doesn't sound like fun. Yes, I anticipate some of these things as well. But we are also not afraid of them. Why? Because they present more opportunities to bubble over with Jesus' love. After all, part of loving others is demonstrating compassion, grace, and teaching them to trust Jesus in their choices.

During my Quiet Time this morning, I was reading in 3 John and Jude. I can't quote the exact location of the verse from memory, but it was defining love. (Feel free to dig in and see if it strikes you as it did me. I was reading from the Amplified.) It was a great reminder that the Lord and the world don't always define love the same way. Love towards God includes trusting Him and obeying His Word. It was actually quite convicting. The Israelites trusted God to be set free from bondage, but didn't believe Him to protect them and enter the Promised Land. As a result, they wandered around in the desert for 40 years. Yes, demonstrating Jesus' love to the children will include hugs, laughter, Jesus' lessons and joy. It will also include teaching them to seek Him, trust Him, obey Him, and rest in Him.

It's time to close. We aren't even in session yet, and it seems there is a lot to say. Please, be in prayer as we anticipate the beginning of the year. Ask the Lord to calm hearts, plant seeds, bring about salvation, and help children/families learn to walk in faith and obedience.

It's going to be a great year! We are eagerly anticipating God's work during the upcoming school year! Praise Jesus!

#### AFRICAN RADIO MINISTRIES-NEWS

Dear Mission friends,

Ethiopia Updates: Through ARM ministries, 100 people declared their faith in Christ as Lord and Savior. Currently, 389 inmates are attending confirmation class and learning how to follow Jesus. 420 Bibles and tracts were distributed to new believers. 221 listeners called in and 3 listening groups were established.

God heals soldier through ARM radio listener: Mulugeta is a regular listener of ARM programs even in the war zone of Northern Ethiopia. No matter the circumstances, he is comforted every week by listening to the message. He can't help but tell his friends and one them was a soldier Sintayehu. One day Sintayehu was in a battle when she suddenly went deaf and fell ill. She was unresponsive in pain and couldn't speak. Due to the war, she was unable to get medical treatment, so Mulugeta called the ARM phone number, asking Rev. Mengistu for prayer. They prayed together asking for healing for his friend in Jesus' name with a resounding Amen! It wasn't until this month, a year later that Sintayehu called and reported to Rev. Mengistu that she was healed at the very time they had prayed for her. She shared how she is now telling many people about God's miraculous healing!

<u>Liberian Updates</u>: Rev. Emmanuel Tengbeh of St. Joseph Evangelical Lutheran Church baptized 14 radio listeners. While the initial hearing from Rev. Tengbeh and District President Rev. Ezekiel Saah is critical, so is the follow-up. The evangelists in the Foya region have been empowered to go and make disciples. They visited listeners who called in from nearby communities, and encouraged whole villages in the Word of God. The Lord moved in the hearts of the 14 but we trust He is not finished yet. These new believers are also taking the invitation back home with them.

They planted, we water, God is increasing! St. Joseph Lutheran Church and School, Foya Tengia is one of several Liberian locations LCMS planted seed prior to the civil war. Rev. John and Kathy Duitsman's family were in SE Liberia while several families were in Lofa County. LCMS missionaries Rev. Bob & Kristi Roegner lived in Foya Tengia training church leaders in the 1980's. The tangible connection of the Roegner's seeds and the current church leaders now watering is evident. Rev. Tengbeh and his family live in the home built by the Roegner's. The palm trees they planted now bear fruit for oil, providing sustainable income for the church ministries and the Tengbeh family. The ministry overseeing all ARM work is Hope and Care of Children, in Liberia. HCC's Executive Director, Rev. Patrick F. Nanning, baptized by Rev. Roegner, went on to plant many churches and establish the first ELCLS school in Liberia. Soon, ARM and Hope and Care Outreach will welcome Rev. Premiering on July 4, Sound of Freedom has been a box office hit. The following review is provided by Movieguide® ~ www.movieguide.org.

Nudity: No nudity, but a man starts to take off his pants in one scene, though nothing is shown.

Alcohol Use/Abuse: There are many scenes with alcohol, for some of the movie the protagonist and his team run a sting operation where they play the role of a sex trafficker and during these encounters they are drinking alcohol.

Smoking and/or Drug Use and Abuse: One character smokes a gigar and gigarette throughout


