From Your Pastor

Now on His way to Jerusalem, Jesus traveled along the border between Samaria and Galilee. As He was going into a village, ten men who had leprosy met Him. They stood at a distance and called out in a loud voice, "Jesus, Master, have pity on us!" When He saw them, He said, "Go, show yourselves to the priests." And as they went, they were cleansed. One of them, when he saw he was healed, came back, praising God in a loud voice. He threw himself at Jesus' feet and thanked Him--and he was a Samaritan. Jesus asked, "Were not all ten cleansed? Where are the other nine? Was no one found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?" Then He said to him, "Rise and go; your faith has made you well" (Luke 17:11-19).

Ten men. Ten men with leprosy. They were outcasts of society. They lived on the fringe—shunned, even feared by all. Their movements were restricted. They had to warn all to stay away by proclaiming "unclean" in their hearing. They were considered to be the worst of sinners, because they had the most vile of diseases. Somehow, they knew and recognized Jesus. They cried out to Him in desperate hope.

Their cry: "Jesus, Master, have mercy"—not a demand for acceptance, but a simple plea for help. They knew their fate: they were doomed to die from this dreadful disease. They knew the reasons for their exclusion from society. And Jesus recognized their call for help. Not with a display of power, but with a simple statement: "Go, show yourselves to the priests."

Their cry for mercy is the same one that we make in our liturgy. "Lord, have mercy"—our Kyrie. And it means the same thing today as it did for these ten. We are not worthy, but, please, Lord, look upon us with favor and give us what we do not deserve. These ten were looking for healing. So are we. They wanted physical healing. So do many of us. Yet, the mercy we more urgently ask for is the forgiveness of our sins, that we may be accepted in the sight of the Father.

These ten were not healed immediately—at least not visibly. Their healing began with what was not visible: Christ's Word. They set out in faith—desperate faith, but faith, nevertheless. They began the journey to the priests to be certified as clean, even though their healing was not yet visible. Along that journey, the healing came. The joy must have been overwhelming. Nine of them continued, even hurried, to see the priests. The other one also hurried, but in a different direction—He returned to thank Jesus. He turned around. He came back glorifying God. He had no questions about who Jesus was. He glorified God, present in the Son. He turned around to thank the One who had given him the thing he desired most. He was not swayed by the crowd mentality. His faith overcame that. He did what he knew was the right thing to do: he turned around to give praise to the One who had given him this gift.

We, too, need to "turn around."

As we celebrate Thanksgiving, we need to recognize the true Source of our gifts. We need to turn around, and look to the ultimate Giver. We so often depend upon our own abilities that we forget that we are but stewards—managers—of these gifts. We need to remember that all that we have is but a gift from God. When we rely upon ourselves, we no longer recognize God as the true Source of all. We, in essence, reject God.

The one leper knew the Source of his blessing. He did not reject God. We are in the same position as that leper. All that we have is ours by God's mercy. We deserve nothing from God because of our sin. We come to church to give thanks to God for the blessings that He showers upon us. And we know that all of the material gifts that we receive are but minor blessings compared to the ultimate gifts that we receive: forgiveness and the gift of eternal life. These are the ultimate, undeserved gifts.

And, just how do we receive these gifts? We receive them the same way that the lepers were healed: by faith; faith in the Word of God. We receive these gifts through the same One who healed the lepers: our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Christ ascended that Cross of Calvary for us, died and rose again to secure every blessing for us.

As you celebrate Thanksgiving Day, think of it as a "Turn Around Day." Consider it a special day to ponder all of God's goodness. Then, do not continue on your way with only your own hopes and desires in view. Instead, receiving God's overflowing and overwhelming goodness, recognize the Giver of all. Turn around daily and in all things with thanksgiving to God.

We have faith. We know the true Source of our gifts. Give thanks to the One that has given us life, His life for our new life, and all that we are and have. Give thanks!

Immanuel Lutheran Church Voter's Meeting Minutes October 16, 2023

- I. Opening Devotion and Prayer Led by Pastor Mahnken on "What does the Holy Spirit do?"
- II. Reading/Approval of Minutes and Agenda Both the October Agenda and the July Minutes were approved.

III. Reports of Officers and Boards A. Elders (Curtis Korner)

Grant Clausen is completing his term of service. Curtis will be starting his second term and Joel Bubke has agreed to serve as an Elder. Curtis also sought the prayerful support of Immanuel members for the Elders and for Pastor Mahnken as they wrestle with some challenging decisions to make.

B. Trustees (Ryan Kragel)

An access point to the attic is being looked at. Landscaping projects have been completed. Potential future projects include new siding on the parsonage (a bid has been submitted by Maverick Roofing/Siding). The other project to consider is the flaking paint above the altar. The trustees will continue to investigate these needs.

- C. Treasurer/Stewardship/Finance (Dick Fredericks) Dick shared the income and expense reports. After 3 quarters of the year is passed, Immanuel is \$4,673.79 ahead.
- D. Education/Youth (Angle Ellis) Rally Day was held in September. Our youth will again be participating in Mercy Meals. Two replacements are needed for the Board of Education.
- E. Preschool (Jessica Ogren)

Everything is running smoothly so far this school year. There was a good response from Immanuel members in purchasing items for Immanuel Preschool. Three people on the Preschool Board will be rotating off. Two of the three slots have been filled, pending the approval of the ballot.

F. Mission/Fellowship (Judy Gierstorf)

The Mission Board will serve a Harvest Dinner on November 5. It will consist of turkey, mashed potatoes, dressing, etc. Judy brought up the possibility of serving breakfast before church to raise money as well. Judy is also acting on the advice of Leslie Gustafson to get children's books into the hands of the preschool children. Judy asked for opinions from the voters about funding/proceeding with this project.

- Nothing to report at this time H. Pastor's Report

In addition to sharing membership statistics, Pastor renewed his plea encouraging Immanuel members to pray 3x daily for the spiritual well being of its members. Also, he made a plea that we pray to guide more young people into being pastors and to purse careers in the Christian education field.

Peggy Wunschel made a motion to allow the serving body to direct the proceeds of the Advent meals as well as the Harvest Dinner. Curtis Korner seconded the motion and the voters approved it unanimously.

B. Budget for 2024

- a. Secretaries: The Elders recommended that Val Teut and Amanda Bruhn each be given a \$1.00/hr raise. The motion was made by Rachel Mentink to follow this recommendation, it was seconded by Guenter Detlefsen, and approved by the voters.
- b. Organist: The Elders recommended that the organist receive a raise from \$80/service to \$85/service. Dick Fredericks made a motion to follow this recommendation, Jerry Ernst seconded that motion, and the voters approved it unanimously.
- c. Tech Coordinator/Videographer: Ryan Ernst currently serves in this capacity. Stemming from COVID, his work allows Immanuel's services to be shared via the internet. The Elder's recommendation was to increase the rate from \$72/service to \$75/service. Motion was made by Leroy Hight to follow this recommendation. Loren Jepsen

seconded the motion and the voters approved it unanimously.

- d. Pastors: It was moved by Leroy Hight, seconded by Dick Fredericks, and approved by the voters to give Pastor Mahnken an annual wage increase of \$1,500 and to give Pastor Kaiser an annual wage increase of \$1,000.

The Trustees recommend that items e, f, and g should all be frozen for the year. Guenter Detlefsen moves to abide by the Trustees recommendation, Glenda Bryson seconded the motion and the voters approve this motion.

Leroy Hight made a motion to make a \$2,500 1 time gift, it was seconded by Dick Fredericks, and unanimously approved by the voters. This gift will be taken from Home Mission after a motion was made by Curtis Korner, seconded by Leroy Hight and approved by the voters.

E. Other

Guenter Detlefsen requested that some improvements be made to some exterior lighting. Ryan Kragel said he would look into it.

Pastor Mahnken's Report Voters' Meeting--October 16, 2023

We began 2023 with 608 baptized members on the books; and 501 communicant members on the books. We have received 12 by Holy Baptism (of these 12 baptized five were adults, who were also added as communicant members). We have added 10 communicant members by adult confirmation (of these five were already baptized). We added six to our number of communicant members by Jr. Confirmation. We have had six deaths: Larry Clausen, Judi Clausen, Curt Schultz, Lois Ernst, Kenny Winsor, and Colton Clausen. We released two from our roll by personal request to other Christian church bodies. We have had one transfer out to another LCMS congregation. We have had two transfer in. As of today, October 16, 2023 we have 618 baptized members on and 510 communicant members on our roll.

Our Saturday evening worship time will be changing. Beginning the 2nd Saturday in November—November 11—our Saturday service will begin at 4 p.m. It will remain at this time until March 9, if all things remain the same.

Please keep in your prayers our neighboring congregations of St. John, Kiron and Faith, Deloit as their pastoral vacancy continues. They are exploring options for their pastoral care. Retired Pastor Gordon Buchholz of Audubon is covering their Sunday services for now. Please also keep in your prayers Christ Lutheran Church in Denison as they have called a pastor to serve them.

Pastor Kaiser, my wife, and I thank you for remembering us yesterday, presenting us with a card and gift on behalf of the congregation.

There are several prayer requests which I invite all of you to continue to include in your daily prayers. One of them is for the war between Israel and Hamas, which is the terrorist organization leading the Gaza Strip. The impending escalation will be of world-wide impact and significance. This event threatens our world in ways we have not seen since 9/11, and I am not exaggerating! For an excellent summary of what has happened to this point, why it has happened, and what is at stake I invite you to read the transcript of Albert Mohler's podcast today, October 16. You could also listen to the podcast. His daily episodes are archived. His podcast is called *The Briefing* and the address is albertmohler.com/the-briefing

A second prayer request is that you daily ask our merciful Lord to call more men to the Pastoral Office and, beyond that more church workers. We face a huge shortage of teachers as well. Everyone should be aware of the huge pastoral shortage we have by now. Fewer pastors means also that those who do serve are asked to cover more broadly and so are stretched more thinly. That is not a good recipe for successful ministry.

I ask you to join me in giving thanks to God for Pastor Kaiser's service among us. He preaches once a month per our agreement with him, but his visits of our shut-ins, his filling in to lead Bible Class during the week when I have other responsibilities, and other assistance he provides exceeds our agreement. Without his service, many things would not get done here at Immanuel.

Finally, I again remind you of my prayer challenge for us all: "Please join me three times a day in prayer for the spiritual growth of the members of Immanuel. Please pray three times a day! Pray that the eyes of our hearts may be opened to the wonder of God's grace. Pray for the Holy Spirit to be at work among us. Pray on behalf of the families and children of Immanuel that they will be blessed with a love for Jesus and a growing zeal to live for Him in this darkening age.

When I was looking over our statistics this afternoon and noted to Val that we had received 10 by Adult Confirmation this year and five of those had also been adult baptisms, she replied "Our prayers are working." Indeed, God has promised to mercifully hear and answer our prayers.

But there is also something telling about five adult baptisms and ten adult confirmations in one year. I did not suddenly become a much better pastor than I was 20 and more years ago! These numbers tell me that we are surrounded by people who did not grow up "in the church." We can't simply assume that everyone around us believes in Jesus and has received saving faith! Besides them, there are many who say they are "in the church" who haven't been in a church to receive God's grace for years! Yes, continue to pray, but we also need to continue to invite and teach and grow in ministry to help one another grow up in our salvation (1 Peter 2:2). And that, again, takes more pastors and more lay people passionately devoted to be involved in the work of ministry. So, more prayers!

Finally, as you pray, thank the Lord Jesus for His promise that whatever we ask the Father in His name, He will give it to us for the glory of our Savior (John 15:16)."

I thank you for your prayers.


Her first thought was that God had abandoned her, until a Pastor reached out from Wyoming and offered her a brand new life. Can she let go of her memories?

Slowly getting to know each other as Missy gets over her grief of losing her husband. Read what surprises lay ahead for them.



As we have mentioned already, we lost several families that moved out of the country and state but continue to outreach to new friends in these two areas. In late September, I had the privilege to lead chapel time at Unity Ridge Lutheran School, so I took the opportunity to make it a bilingual one. The kids enjoy this every time!

Our immigration workshop was very successful. Many families were informed on how to continue their efforts to become legal residents and become future USA citizens and were also given referrals to lawyers and other agencies. We continue to look for opportunities to meet the needs of our community and make new friends.

During our District conference I was able to share a lot of what I am sharing with you here. More opportunities are opening up so that we can go to new areas of the district and develop more Hispanic ministries. ALIENS: EXTRATERRESTRIAL VISITORS OR EXTRADIMENSIONAL INTRUDERS?

Aliens exist, there's no two ways about it." Helen Sharman, Britain's first person in space (in 1992), offered these confident words just weeks ago. She went on to offer, "It's possible they're here right now and we simply can't see them."

What do you think?

Many people have claimed to see aliens. Some even claim to have been abducted by them. Yes, many of these have been exposed as hoaxes or weather balloons or a meteorological event or birds or some other natural explanation, but a handful remain unexplainable by any natural account. And some of these claims have been made by reputable people (like Ms. Sharman).

And, if you were to look back through history, you'd see that people have been reporting unknown lights and objects in the skies for thousands of years – people from India to England, from the Americas to China. The Ancient Greeks and Romans have stories about "fiery globes" and "flaming chariots" that flew through the skies. The American Indians told stories about "flying canoes" and "great silvery airships."

What are we to make out of it all? Are aliens real?

Let's take a few moments to think it through. Before we conclude our planet has been visited by beings from other planets, let's first ask if beings even exist on other planets. If life only exists on earth, the whole question of extraterrestrials must be reconsidered.

So, is there life "out there"? Let's start with Scripture. God's Word tells us that God created the sun and the moon and all the stars "to govern the day and night and to separate light from darkness" (Genesis 1:18). In other words, the moon and the sun, the stars and all the planets, were given for Earth – for us. The universe was made for us!

This is a significant and surprising truth, one that moves believers to wonder and awe. King David marveled: "When I look at Your heavens, the work of Your fingers, the moon and the stars, which You have set in place, what is man that You are mindful of him, and the son of man that You care for him?" (Psalm 8:3-4)

The majesties of space were created for us, for our enjoyment and to mark seasons and time for us. This doesn't necessarily prove there isn't life "out there," but it is strongly suggestive. Space was created for earth (and science is showing us how precisely positioned we are for space observation and discovery!).

Darwinian evolutionists struggle to accept this, seeing the universe as a vast waste of space if life only exists on earth. Carl Sagan, the famous evolutionist, expressed this sentiment when he offered, "The universe is a pretty big place. If it's just us, seems like an awful waste of space."

In fact, many evolutionists, having acknowledged the insurmountable odds to spontaneously generating life on earth, are increasingly looking to space to account for life's origin on earth. The theory is called *panspermia*. It a nutshell, it purports that aliens seeded life on earth, which then evolved.[1]

But this assumes other planets are capable of supporting life (and then developing technology to get it here!). Ms. Sharman (quoted above) offers, "There are so many billions of stars out there in the universe that there must be all sorts of different forms of life..."

That seems reasonable until you consider something called "habitable zones." A habitable zone is a condition that has to be just right for life to exist on a planet. So, think Goldilocks. There are currently 13 known habitable zones that have to be met before Goldilocks will be happy, before Goldilocks is even able to sample the bears' porridge. These include things like the existence of liquid water, the level of ultraviolet radiation, the planetary rotation rate, the tilt of the planet, the atmospheric electric field, the levels of carbon dioxide and monoxide, and many more.

Jay Richards and Guillermo Gonzelez were astounded by these realities and wrote the book *The Privileged Planet* to communicate how unlikely our planet is and to suggest it just might be favored in the cosmos (it was made into a documentary, which is well worth watching!) They wrote, "Precious few plots of galactic real estate are as amenable to complex life as ours..." As scientific knowledge advances, the number of habitable zones continues to decrease as the number of potential planetary candidates for supporting life continues to dwindle.

But let's just assume space is teeming with aliens. Where are they? Voyager 1, NASA's space probe launched in 1977, has long ago passed Pluto without a hint of alien life detected. But maybe they're farther out. If so, how did they get to earth?

Consider a few stark realities. Light travels at an astonishing 186,000 miles per second. If we could achieve this speed (a feat we will discuss below), it would take 4.2 years to reach the next closest star after the sun. To traverse our galaxy, it would take 100,000 years. To reach the next galaxy like our own (and, therefore, the one with the greatest chance of supporting life) would take 2.3 million years (and the one after that is 20 million light years away!).[2]

Are we to assume these little ETs hopped in their spacecraft, dropped it into warp drive, and zipped along for millions of years to flit around in our skies? Radar has picked up unidentified flying objects, but it has never detected one leaving our atmosphere. Where do they go? They're certainly not going home and back! Are they able to make physical structures disappear?

Further, when you consider the physical realities of traveling at the speed of light, you quickly realize how hopeless such space travel is. Consider this: to propel an object that weighs one pound to a velocity 50% the speed of light would require an energy source equal to the energy of 98 Hiroshima-sized atomic bombs. To get something the size of a space shuttle to 50% the speed of light would require 23 million atomic bombs. It would require the same amount of energy to stop the craft!

And, lest you think this might somehow be achievable, these little aliens would also have to figure out how to avoid planets and stars. Worse, they've have to figure out how to avoid the dust in space! Hitting a piece of dust at a mere 10% the speed of light would be like hitting 10 tons of TNT. At 50% it would be like slamming into 2.2 atomic bombs! Because of this, these little green dudes would need to develop a dust detection system that would be capable of traveling faster than the speed of light to detect the dust light years ahead so as to perform evasive maneuvers. But this would put such gravitational pressure on them that it would kill them. Anything over 9 Gs kills people and destroys ships. Imagine the impact of millions of Gs!

These are the hard realities standing between us an alien visitation. And, to be as charitable as possible, even assuming evolutionary ages, there hasn't been enough time for such advanced life to evolve somewhere out there and get here. Reality has a way of asserting itself.

But what about people who claim to have been abducted? Did they make it up? Some may have. Many, however, probably had a genuine experience, not with extraterrestrial beings, though. What they likely experienced was extradimensional beings. And the Bible has a word for them: demons.

Why, for instance, do "alien" abductees often report that their abductors disparaged Jesus and His Word? Why would aliens from distant galaxies travel here to ridicule Jesus and His Word? And why is there such a lack of committed, confessing, practicing Christians reporting abductions? And why do abductees report being released immediately upon the invocation of Jesus' name? Why would aliens submit to Jesus? Aren't these realities a bit suggestive?

Gary Bates, author of *Alien Intrusion*, and source for much of the information in this article, offers this conclusion to his extensively documented study:

These entities are not real physical ETs from other planets. They are from another dimension... So, to find their source, one needs to wear 'spiritual glasses.' Unfortunately, most of these modern-day researchers have embraced a humanistic-based view of the world, with the theory of evolution serving as the creator of both them and the aliens. This opens them up to spiritual deception and, in turn, has blinded them to the claims of the Bible, which makes God the Creator. I suggest the answers they have been looking for but do not want to hear may be – 'God is real, and the Bible is true.'

Ms. Sharman (quoted at the beginning of this article) is partially right. "Aliens" exist and they are among us, but they are not, in fact, extraterrestrial; they are extradimensional. They are demons. Scripture speaks openly of them even as it declares Jesus' decisive victory over them. And there are no two ways about this: Jesus lives and Jesus reigns!

^[1] Space prevents detailing the challenges to evolving life from simple to complex. In brief, evolutionists propose two mechanisms to move evolution upward: natural selection and genetic mutations. Natural selection enables an organism to adapt to its environment, but it never creates any new genetic information. Genetic mutations do a fine job of deleting, duplicating, or damaging existing genetic information, but they, likewise, never create any new genetic information. In other words, these proposed mechanisms can account for variation within an organism kind (think variation in the dog kind), but they cannot create new kinds (like a green haired dog or moving a dog to a horse).

^[2] Why are we assuming the speed of light? Here's why: if we assume normal space travel speed (38,000 miles per hour), it would take over 11 million years to reach earth from the next comparable galaxy. Those poor little aliens would starve!
