From Your Pastor

What is the most important thing in life? We may not actually think upon that question and determine our answers on a daily basis; yet, our decisions and our actions show what is most important for us. For some people the most important thing in life is financial security. They go to school, study hard, and hope to get a wellpaying job. Others will work extra hours to provide more security. Ask other people what they consider the most important thing in life, and they will tell you it is their family. They make time for their loved ones and enjoy their time together more than anything else. If you ask someone who has a terminal or even a chronic illness about the most important thing in life, and they will tell you good health is the most important.

What is most important? Stand beside the casket of someone you love—and some day others will stand beside your casket—and we will reconsider. Death makes us pause and consider our own lives, our situation, our direction, and our priorities. Nothing of this world matters when life is over.

God the Holy Spirit tells us without a doubt what is most important in life through the pen of St. Paul in in 1 Corinthians 15:3-4: "I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that He was buried, that He was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures." The message of Jesus Christ, God's Son, our Savior, crucified for our sins and raised to life on the third day for our forgiveness and our life with Him now and forever is of first importance. The Easter message is of utmost importance for this simple reason: We are saved by it and through faith in it!

Jesus once asked the question very pointedly, "What do you benefit if you gain the whole world but lose your own soul" (Mark 8:36). So, first things first, God has our life with Him in His attention and His care—the care of our entire

being—our body and eternal soul. That was first and foremost in the mind and action of God. God created us, but we have sinned against Him. Everyone. Daily. Much. Sin separates us from God. Death separates us from loved ones, our spiritual death in sin separates us from the love of God. Without someone intervening on our behalf that separation is destined for eternal separation in hell.

In His great love for us, God first and foremost had in His plan for us to save us from our sins. This is of first importance because this is what God has done to save us from His judgement against sins and the eternal separation from Him that our sins rightly deserve. He sent Jesus, His Son, to become a man to live and die in our place. As God's Son He and He alone could pay that price. He did for us. Neither death nor the grave could hold Him. He rose from the dead on the third day. He lives forever, and all who believe in His sacrificial death for them for forgiveness, have also the gift of eternal life.

He restored us to Himself and has made this good news known to us. First and foremost in life is daily following Him. Everything else will be left when we die. He who has faith in the Son of God has life, eternal life.

Come worship in wonder with us, and especially during our Holy Week and Easter services. Receive and celebrate our Savior with us!

What is most important in your life, and why? How does it show? Jesus, our crucified and risen Savior gives us eternal security. He also gives us perspective for the rest of this life. He helps to remind us what is truly important. He brings a joy that rises above every sorrow and endures forever. Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!



The Reno Western Saga Series By Gilbert Morris

There are many books in our library for your reading pleasure—fiction, non-fiction, biographies, self-help, faith building, etc. But did you know, especially those readers who prefer/like westerns, that we have several sitting on our shelves just waiting to be checked out.

One of the outstanding authors of western books is Gilbert Morris. Mr. Morris is the author of many best-selling books, including the series of the Reno Western Saga. Morris spent ten years as a pastor before becoming a professor of English at a university in Arkansas.

The Reno Western Saga series includes the titles "Reno", "Rimrock", "Ride the Wild River", and "Boomtown".

Rimrock was a frontier town with Jesse Lindsey as its marshal, who has done his best to keep the peace; however Jesse is feeling his age and the town needs a strong man to keep a lid on the violence. The unruly trail hands and greedy saloon owners will listen only to a man who knows how to use force. After Jesse is wounded in a street fight, a new man has to be appointed as sheriff. That man is Reno, who is a war-weary soldier/drifter whom Jesse and his daughter saved from a fever and nursed back to health. As the new deputy, Reno has to face death threats from a saloon owner and the gunslinger the owner has brought to town.

If you are a fan of westerns, you might consider checking out this series and many more of Morris' outstanding books.

Shhhh, did you hear that? Nope, it's not the preschool if you need to be quiet to hear us! It's almost April and the volume within our walls is ramping up steam. Yes, the sun stays out longer and the children have a touch of spring fever. Everyone has built friendships and have a lot to say throughout the day.

Yesterday, the morning class was talking about Jesus when He died. We don't officially begin Easter until next week so I'm not even sure how we got on the topic. One of the little girls looked at me and said, "And when they took Him off the cross they put Him in a cage." Pause. Wait. "Could you repeat that for me?" Sure. "They put Jesus in a cage and locked Him in there."

Needless to say, after a moment of reflection it occurred to me that the referenced cage was actually a "cave." I often refer to the tomb as a cave with the children. It seems to be more like something they can put into context. This little girl had heard me refer to the cave and was positive Jesus was being locked in a cage after He was taken down from the cross. She had the right idea, just the wrong wording.

I am a bit taken aback upon reflection of her wisdom. How often do we do this same thing? We read the Word. We hear a sermon. We take what we are hearing and plug it into what we know. We connect it to what we think we heard? It becomes more about our own experiences than the truth of what Scripture actually says. John and I are attending a Bible study and it's a very "back to the basics." Yet, I feel like I'm in complete new discovery mode. It's the fundamentals of the faith. Even the professional athletes continue practice the fundamentals. We cannot

walk in the victory God has for us without being rooted and grounded in the truths of His Word. How often do we hear cage rather than cave? I am so grateful that a little girl heard the wrong word so I could be reminded of how often I read Scripture and then try to fit Jesus into my box versus reading Scripture and allowing God's Spirit to blow up my box and transform my life. Oh, the gift of these little people to keep providing the Lord situations to teach us!

Please pray for us as the end of the year quickly approaches. As we head into Easter, I pray the Gospel and His love will be at the forefront of each child's mind. May this season draw everyone closer to His heart as we share in the celebration of His victorious resurrection.

Shewaye, a radio listener, shares his inspiring story: "One evening at my father's home, we gathered around the dinner table with our usual coffee and enjoyed each other's company. As always, we turned on the radio to catch up on the news. That night, I decided to switch the station and stumbled upon the Africa Radio Oromo program broadcast by ARM. Suddenly, our family fell quiet, as we listened to the preacher talking about Jesus. We felt so uplifted by the message that we started tuning in every week. At that time, I wasn't a believer, but after hearing the Bible messages repeatedly, my whole family and I found faith in the Lord.

Our lives were transformed; we began reading the Bible together, and a wonderful peace filled our home. Not long after, we invited our neighbors to join us in listening to the radio broadcasts, and thankfully, they also came to believe!

Our group has grown to 17 members and counting. At first, we met in my dad's house to gather, then eventually we rented a small house for worship. We love Jesus, but we sometimes feel lost without guidance in understanding God's word, especially since there isn't a church nearby. In these challenging times, we support each other through prayer, together and individually. Today, we are so excited that Rev. Fekadu from ARM took the time to visit us and guide us forward."



Join Us As We Celebrate a Passover Seder Wednesday, April 9 at 5:45 p.m.

In place of our regular midweek Lent worship on Wednesday, April 9,

we will participate in a Passover Seder in our Fellowship Hall at 5:45 p.m. The Passover Seder is a celebration of redemption, a memorial of God's deliverance of His people from slavery in Egypt. As Christians we celebrate the Passover Seder to also recognize its fulfillment in Jesus our Redeemer.

A Passover Seder has symbolic foods, Bible readings, and fellowship. Each food consumed as part of the Seder recalls an aspect of the Israelites exodus from Egypt. These foods remind us of the bitterness of their enslaved life, their tears and suffering, and the haste which they left.

After the Seder portion, we will have a supper of more traditional foods served today at Seder celebrations: chicken and matzo ball soup and chicken cacciatore.

I WHEN I SURVEY THE WONDROUS CROSS

Few believers ever learn to truly love the cross of Christ. For though it offers great deliverance, it also demands great sacrifice. Isaac Watts drives this truth home through the words and music of this powerful hymn. Watts was deeply disappointed with the hymns of his day, which failed to inspire his parishioners to genuine worship and holy living. His dissatisfaction led him to compose more than six hundred hymns, all designed to call his congregation to a deeper knowledge and worship of God.

The music of this hymn was borrowed from Gregorian chant. Its rich, grave tones call those who sing it to realize the seriousness of Christ's sacrificial death. What shall we offer to God in grateful return of His gracious gift? All that we are and have is but a small offering in return for such great love.

When I survey the wondrous cross On which the Prince of Glory died, My richest gain I count but loss And pour contempt on all my pride.

Forbid it, Lord, that I should boast Save in the death of Christ, my God; All the vain things that charm me most, I sacrifice them to His blood.

See, from His head, His hands, His feet Sorrow and love flow mingled down! Did e'er such love and sorrow meet Or thorns compose so rich a crown?

Were the whole realm of nature mine, That were a tribute far too small; Love so amazing, so divine, Demands my soul, my life, my all!

A New Creation

If anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come!

All this is from God, who reconciled us to Himself through Christ

and gave us the ministry of reconciliation. (2 Corinthians 5:17-18)

Two men attending a convention committed every transgression they could. Traveling to the airport, a sinfully sacrilegious idea came to one of them: Why not top off the trip with a shockingly scandalous bit of irreverence? "I dare you to go into the first church we come to and confess everything you did last night. I'll bet \$100 you can't do it," he challenged. His companion accepted by saying "Sounds like easy money to me."

The first church they came to was Catholic. The man found the priest and began, "Father, forgive me for I have sinned." In graphic detail, he told of his escapades. The perceptive priest, discerning the man's insincerity, replied, "My friend, I give you a simple penance. Go to the front of the church, kneel before the statue of Jesus, look into the Savior's suffering face, see the nails in His hands and feet, the crown of thorns on His head, and say, 'Jesus, all this You suffered for me, and I couldn't care less."

The man came out of the confessional and demanded his friend pay up. He replied, "first, do your penance." The confessor went to the altar, looked up to the Christ on the crucifix and facetiously began, "Jesus all this You did for me and I ..." At that moment something he had learned, and ignored, flooded his head and heart. He cleared his throat and tried again, "Lord Jesus, all this You did for me ..." Then he burst into tears and the Savior Christ reclaimed and redeemed a lost soul. That man, by the power of the Holy Spirit, became a new creature.

Scripture says if you are in Christ, you are a new creation. So, are you? You can find power in the cross and hope at Jesus' empty tomb. Human hearts that are hardened find themselves convicted and converted. At the cross, sufferers find solace, repentants find redemption. And the unforgiven find freedom.

You can do just about anything to the cross and the empty tomb, except ignore them. You can't disregard the cross upon which your sins were crucified. You can't discount an empty grave that says, "Here death has been defeated." Why? Because the cross and the empty grave are God's power to create a new creature (1 Corinthians 1:23-24).

A Prayer for Good Friday

O Christ, Lamb of God, slain for the sin of the whole world, with penitent heart I come to Your cross, pleading for mercy and forgiveness. My sins—and they are many—have added to the burden of Your suffering and have nailed You to the accursed tree. For me You tasted the agony of the utter darkness that I might not perish, but have everlasting life. Have mercy upon me.

O Christ, Lamb of God, embrace me with Your love, and forgive me all my sins. Your death brings healing to my soul, peace to my mind, cleansing to my heart. If You would mark iniquity, I could not come for my hands are unclean, my lips are sullied, and my heart is blackened by sin. But beholding You bleeding, despised, forsaken, dying, pierced, I come to be cleansed and forgiven.

O Christ, Lamb of God, grant that I may hate sin and wickedness more and more as I behold You in Your great agony. My grateful heart today finds hope in Your words, comfort in Your promises, and salvation in Your finished work on the cross, by which You have overcome sin, Satan and death.

A Prayer for Easter

O almighty and eternal God, who through the death of Your Son has destroyed sin and death, and by His rising to life again restored innocence and everlasting life, that being delivered from the power of the devil, I might live under You in Your kingdom, grant that I may be forever comforted by true faith in the resurrection of Your dear Son. Do not let the thought of death fill my heart with terror, but give me the blessed assurance that, just as You raised Christ from the dead, I will not remain in the grave but will rise again at the end of days. And when, by Your grace, I have finished my course, let Christ's resurrection be for me a sure pledge that an inheritance that does not fade is reserved for me in heaven. While I live, guide me with Your holy counsel, and when I die, give me the crown of life, that with all the holy angels and the elect I may praise and glorify You, world without end. Amen.
