From Your Pastor

Next month, we will join millions of Americans to exercise a most important part of the influence of our Christian life—we will vote in our country's elections. Jesus said, "Give to Caesar [governing authority] what is Caesar's and to God what is God's" (Matthew 22:21). Jesus also said to us, "You are the salt of the earth ... You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven" (Matthew 5:13-16).

As Christians, it is vital that we VOTE, but, more importantly, we need to know what principles determine our vote. Biblically, there is a necessary differentiation between the work of the State and the work of the Church. Simply stated, the Church is the institution that brings God's blessing and goodness into the world. The State is the coercive, Law/Order institution, whose task is to keep peace and provide an environment for people to flourish to carry forward God's design and purposes.

America is one country that has uniquely differentiated the Church and the State by limiting the State's coercive power while freeing the faith motivated, morally directed (see 10 Commandments), and self-governing citizen to virtuously pursue life, liberty, and happiness. In America, the Government's role is not to be the all-encompassing agent in/of our lives, but to undergird one's God-given freedom so we can freely be the moral agents of our life, liberty, and happiness. My vote will seek to affirm that limited view of government (Give to Caesar what is Caesars – Matthew 22) and that view of self-governing citizenship which depends on faith, family, and Church for flourishing personally and communally.

To vote well this year, I believe, one must ask this most basic question sincerely, "Should the government even be doing this or that?" Lost in all the rhetoric, PR, and name-calling is the question of whether government should be involved in marriage, whether government can replace fathers in the home, whether government has the right to determine/enforce defi-

nitions of "male, female," whether government should ever sanction the taking of innocent life (abortion, infanticide, euthanasia), whether government should "take care of citizens who can take care of themselves," whether government should determine curricula for all of education or just be limited to civics, whether government should create agencies that meddle in virtually every aspect of life or not.

Therefore, I believe that the Christian citizen should desire politicians and policies that properly differentiate the role of the State and the Church in our lives:

- favoring the limitation of government's coercive involvement in our lives to a clearly defined, healthy minimum;
- favoring and promoting the sanctity and protection of innocent human life in the womb;
- favoring also, the fundamental authority of parents with their children in education;
- incentivizing the institutional nature of marriage between one woman and one man for life and its necessary blessing for the culture;
- promoting law/order for all with equal justice under the law for safe communities for all; and,
- promoting property rights and self-defense for people who wish to create homes of safety, peace, and prosperity for one's children and one's neighborhoods.

Christians vote for principles that honor the commands of the Scripture and the Scripture's definition and limitation of the role of government in our lives, freeing believers then to rise to the occasion of compassionately loving our neighbors in spirit and in truth, caring for those whom God brings into our lives, not as a government program but as a healthy relationship, a personal ministry or a broader ministry of our Church family.

There are those who had no idea how to hold a scissors who managed to cut out a craft project today independently. The BEST part by far has been hearing feedback that children are talking about Jesus at home!

Today was a bit more emotional than we've had yet. I even googled it to see if it was a full moon! (Nope, not yet!) It is unusual for our afternoon students to cry because they miss their parents because most of them have already been here a year. However, today we had that exception. One of the students was feeling exceptionally lonesome for her parents and as we were sitting at the rug for Jesus Time, I heard this broken gasping sob as she asked, "Could you pray to Jesus for my heart to not be broken?" Of course, we immediately stopped and the entire class joined in prayer as we took her broken heart before the throne. While we didn't get an instantaneous answer to no tears, we did get to see a happy little child who spent the entire recess playing with a new friend. There was laughter, running, and a lot of joy.

It is such a great reminder to me of the value in going before the Lord in a state

of transparency. How often are we missing someone? Hurting? Etc. Are we willing to be vulnerable before our peers and ask them for prayer? When our friend does ask us for prayer, are we willing to stop everything and pray right there on the spot?

Once the children had finished praying for the student, I asked if the hurting child would like to sit right beside their friends. I suggested that while the parents couldn't be there at that exact moment, there was a room full of friends who were willing to fill a broken heart with love. It was with tear streaked cheeks that a big yes was conveyed by the nod of a head. Wow! What an amazing example I witnessed of little people who may have been unable to alleviate the pain of a friend, yet were willing to sit and let the love of Jesus spill into the situation. Oh, I want to be that person. I want to have so much of Jesus that the compassion will flow without a word ever needing to be spoken.

In Bohobli, Cote d'Ivoire, a new preaching station has emerged thanks to the initiative of dedicated listeners who were inspired by the worship program. After receiving requests for visitation, the pastors organized Bible Studies for several weeks, paving the way for the commencement of worship services. As the group grappled with the challenge of not having a dedicated church building, an innovative solution arose when a generous member offered her shed as a temporary house of worship.

The passing of Rev. Saah, a devoted servant of God, is a great loss to all who knew him. He served as Foya ARM Manager and Foya District President, dedicating himself to equipping church leaders to spread the message of Christ with zeal. Rev. Saah was also a passionate advocate for the training of peer groups so that men, women, and youth could all contribute to the growth of Foya churches. The impact of his efforts is evident in the number of baptisms, church plants, and transformed lives in Foya.

Rev. Saah was the founder and senior pastor of Trinity ELCLS, one of the largest Lutheran Schools in Liberia, with an annual enrollment of 1,000+ students. He also led the HCC Foya Branch, providing a home for vulnerable children.



Why Christians Must Vote

In his letter to the church in Rome, the Apostle Paul writes, "Let every person be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God" (Rom. 13:1-2).

With that statement, Paul defines the relationship between Christians and government. Throughout the Book of Acts, Paul invokes his Roman citizenship to make a passionate defense of the Gospel. Instead of shying away from engagement with the governing authorities, he engages them by proclaiming truth. However, he also puts his trust in God's sovereignty because he knows that the ultimate authority and judge is the Lord, who has allowed those to be in authority so God's purposes can be accomplished.

One of the ways God's purposes are accomplished is through the faithfulness of believers who use their influence, in a proper and respectful manner, to influence secular governments and to hold government officials accountable for their actions. In his book Politics According to the Bible, respected theologian Dr. Wayne Grudem shares numerous examples such as Daniel's influence on King Nebuchadnezzar and John the Baptist boldly speaking biblical truth to King Herod and the other officials of the Roman Empire.

Additionally, Chuck Colson, the founder of Prison Fellowship, once noted that, "Christ, not politics, is our hope. He's called us to engage, to discern, and to the best of our abilities, uphold good and lessen evil." He also reminds us that, "It's our duty as citizens of the kingdom of God to be the best citizens of the society we live in. To do that, we must vote."

Not all of us are able to boldly stand before the government officials to speak the truth. But what we can do is use our God-given right to exert significant influence through exercising our right to be involved in the political process by voting. That is what we are Christians are to do: to utilize the authority the Lord has given us to influence those God has placed in authority over us and hold them accountable for their actions. It is critical that we do so if we want to live in a nation that honors God and His truth while keeping our trust in the Lord and His plan for our nation and world.

Call on the Lord

During times of trouble I called on the Lord. The Lord answered me [and] set me [free from all of them]. Psalm 118:5

You must learn to call on the Lord. Don't sit all alone or lie on the couch, shaking your head and letting your thoughts torture you. Don't worry about how to get out of your situation or brood about your terrible life, how miserable you feel, and what a bad person you are. Instead, say, "Get a grip on yourself, you lazy bum! Fall on your knees, and raise your hands and eyes toward heaven. Read a psalm. Say the Lord's Prayer, and tearfully tell God what you need." This passage teaches us to call on him. Similarly, David said, "I pour out my complaints in his presence and tell him my troubles" (Psalm 142:2). God wants you to tell him your troubles. He doesn't want you to keep them to yourself. He doesn't want you to struggle with them all alone and torture yourself. Doing this will only multiply your troubles.

God knows you will be too weak to overcome your troubles by yourself. He wants you to grow strong in him. Then, he will be the one who receives the glory. Out of difficult experiences emerge true Christians. Without troubles, people talk a lot about faith and the Spirit but don't really know what these things are or what they're saying.

You must never doubt that God knows your troubles and hears your prayers. You must not pray haphazardly or pray as if you're shouting into the wind. This mocks prayer and tests God. In this case, it would be better not to pray at all. You must learn to appreciate the part of the passage that says, "The Lord answered me [and] set me [free from all of them]." The psalmist acknowledged that the Lord heard him and released him from his troubles.




